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Attorney jailed for money laundering disbarred

A 65-year-old former Aiken attorney and former judge who was sentenced to 12 months in federal prison for money laundering and conspiracy to commit mail fraud has been disbarred by the state of South Carolina.

John W. Harte Jr., who is incarcerated in the federal prison system, was disbarred retroactive to Sept. 22, 2009 – the date of his interim suspension. He will

ion filed HARTF Monday. Harte pleaded guilty in September 2009 to his role in a conspiracy to conceal money and property that his former client, Aiken resident William J. Trier

II, stole from an employer, Dixie Narco, the U.S. Attorney's Office said at the time. Trier used his position with the company to create and approve payment for false invoices.

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Along with Columbia attorney John Fitzgerald O'Connor Jr., Harte assisted Trier in hiding more than \$5,200,000 that Trier embezzled over a 10-year period, beginning in 1997.

Harte was hired by Trier on or around February 2007 to represent him in a criminal matter, and,

at some point thereafter, Harte began helping him to conceal the proceeds of his criminal activities, according to Monday's order.

"In consultation with others, respondent knowingly conspired with Mr. Trier to take actions that were intended to hide, conceal and protect the proceeds and assets that resulted from Mr. Trier's criminal activities," the order read.

Harte was committed to the United States Bureau of Prisons on Oct. 13, 2010, and is being housed at

S.C.'s Williamsburg Federal Correctional Institution, according to a federal inmate search. He has a projected release date of Nov. 11.

In addition to the prison sentence, Harte was jointly responsible for \$483,350 in restitution.

The disbarment order stated that Harte has violated the Rules of Professional Conduct by assisting a client in conduct he knew was criminal or fraudulent, by committing a criminal

Further, the order stated, "It shall be ground for discipline for lawyer to be convicted of a crime of moral turpitude or a serious crime.'

A phone call answered at Harte's former law office Monday afternoon confirmed that Harte is no longer practicing law.
